Dear Colleague:

This newsletter contains essential information concerning lodging and registration for our upcoming 26th annual meeting to be held at Oregon State University, Corvallis, **14-18 July 2007**. The abstract deadline is 31 January 2007 for the electronic submission of abstracts. Information is also being provided about meeting events, travel awards to the ASV meeting, renewal of membership dues, ASV virology jobs website, discounted journal subscriptions, and future meetings, among other items. The minutes of the Society's annual business meeting on 17 July 2006 are enclosed.

26th Annual Meeting – Oregon State University, Corvallis, OR Saturday 14 July – Wednesday, Noon, 18 July

Registration and arrangements. You may register for the meeting and housing directly online on the conference web site at <http://oregonstate.edu/conferences/asv2007>. Registration and housing forms are also available on the site to print and submit by mail. For questions about ASV'07 registration, contact OSU Conference Services, (800) 678-6311, Fax: (541) 737-9315. Registration fees are \$395 for current (dues paid for 2007) ASV members, \$495 for non-members, \$295 for graduate students, and \$80 for guests. **The above registration fee for members, non-members, and graduate students includes buffet lunches Sunday through Tuesday.**

- **Full registration** includes admission to the Saturday evening Welcome Reception and evening socials at the CH2M HILL Alumni Center, all scientific sessions, the poster sessions, and the scientific exhibits. The fee also includes conference coffee breaks, **buffet lunches on Sunday, Monday, and Tuesday (excludes dinners)** and drink tickets for certain social functions. Please note that the fees for the buffet lunches cannot be waived or segregated from the full registration fee.
- **Student registration** includes all of the above.
- **Guest registration** allows admission to only the *social* events. A meal package consisting of buffet lunches and dinners may be purchased separately by guests if registration is completed before July 1, 2007.

Lodging. **On-campus** ASV participants and their guests may stay at Halsell, Bloss or Finley residence halls on the OSU campus located across from the conference facilities. All residence halls are furnished with linens and basic amenities. Residence halls are not air-conditioned. Most accommodations are double rooms with two twin beds. A limited number of single rooms are available. Rates per person are \$55/night per person for single occupancy and \$45/night per person for double occupancy. This rate includes a full breakfast service in the nearby Arnold Dining Center and dinner at the McNary Dining Center. Campus-housing reservation requests must be received by July 1, 2007. Housing forms are available on the conference web site (<http://oregonstate.edu/conferences/asv2007>) for online reservations or you may download the form and submit it by mail. Questions regarding on-campus housing should be referred to the OSU Conferences Services (541) 737-9300; conferences@oregonstate.edu. In addition, blocks of rooms have been reserved for ASV '07 participants at the Hilton Garden Inn, the headquarter hotel for OSU conference facilities, and other hotels

within the City of Corvallis. A complete listing and further details regarding hotels in the area is available on the conference website. When reserving your hotel room you should identify yourself as a participant of ASV'07 or the American Society for Virology and make your reservation **before June 12** to receive the special conference rate.

Abstracts. The **deadline is 31 January 2007** for receipt of all abstracts, which must be submitted electronically for processing to FASEB (Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology). Complete instructions for electronic submission are provided on the FASEB website that can be accessed through the conference web site at <http://oregonstate.edu/conferences/asv2007>. If you are technically unable to use the abstract website for electronic submission, please contact the FASEB webmaster well in advance of the deadline date for assistance at asv2007@faseb.org or telephone (301) 634-7042. A combined Call-for-Abstracts and Registration booklet was mailed to all ASV members in November. All information contained in the booklet is available through the conference web site. The website also contains on-line forms for submitting meeting and housing registration, travel grant application forms for the ASV'07 meeting, and information and instructions for the electronic submission of ASV abstracts. If you did not receive a copy of the booklet and require this information by mail, please contact our office either by email at asv@asv.org, by telephone (419) 383-5173, or by fax at (419) 383-2881.

ASV members with current, full-member status are invited to submit or to sponsor scientific abstracts for presentation in workshop and poster sessions at the annual meeting. Non-members, associate members, and associate-student members may submit abstracts only if they are sponsored by a current full member of ASV. **A current full member is one who has received notification of his/her election to the Society and for whom payment of the 2007 membership dues has been received by the ASV Secretary-Treasurer's office.** If you would like to check your membership status, contact our office by telephone at (419) 383-5173 or by email at asv@asv.org.

Please note that abstracts for which oral presentations are requested are submitted with the understanding that if the original speaker is unable to present, someone else from that laboratory will do so, as stated on the abstract form, to wit, "*Since abstract withdrawals greatly disrupt the continuity of the workshops, please DO NOT apply for an oral presentation unless you are CERTAIN that you or a co-author will present the paper.*"

Travel: Corvallis is served by Portland International Airport (PDX) which has many national airline connections (United, Northwest, Southwest, American, Continental, Delta, Alaska) and the Eugene Regional Airport. Corvallis is approximately 90 miles from PDX. Therefore, conference-arranged shuttle service will be offered to participants arriving on July 14th and departing on July 18th at a cost of \$65 USD for a round-trip ticket. You must reserve the shuttle service by completing the appropriate section on the meeting registration form not later than July 1st. The conference website contains information about additional shuttle service options available from PDX and from the Eugene Regional Airport (45 minutes to the South of Corvallis). We are suggesting that attendees make their travel arrangements sooner rather than later.

In conjunction with ASV'07, two satellite meetings will be held simultaneously on Saturday, 14 July, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. **Please Note: All satellite symposium attendees and speakers must pay the registration fee for the general ASV meeting in addition to the registration fee for the satellite meeting listed on the ASV meeting registration form.** Complete program information will be available on the conference website.

The ASV Veterinary Virology Club will present a program on two overlapping topics, organized by Colin Parrish, entitled "Influenza Virus in Animals and Humans" and "Vaccinating Against Difficult Viruses." Workshop Presentations. Each meeting participant may make only one workshop presentation. All speakers in workshops, as well as those in the symposia, will be able to utilize PowerPoint presentations if they wish. **It will not be possible to use personal laptop computers for workshop presentations.** PCs and data projection units (LCDs) supporting XGA will be available at each workshop site for PowerPoint presentations. All workshop PCs will be loaded with the Windows XP Operating System and PowerPoint XP. There will be limited support for computer full-motion video (.mpg, .mov, .wav, or .avi format). **It is strongly suggested that your presentation be developed in PowerPoint XP or a compatible version, (i.e., Mac PowerPoint X).** Overhead projectors and slide projectors will NOT be available. Presenters will be required to report to the Speaker Ready Room a **minimum of three hours prior** to the start of their session with their PowerPoint presentation saved on one of the following formats: USB Flash Drive, CD-ROM, DVD-ROM, 100 or 250 MB Zip Disk (Mac- or PC-formatted). At that time, presenters **MUST** preview their presentations which will then be downloaded onto workshop PCs. Travel Awards to the ASV’07 Meeting. The **postmark deadline** to apply for each of the following awards is **31 January 2007**. To apply, applicants should complete the appropriate travel grant application distributed with the Call-for-Abstracts booklet; they are also available on the conference website at <http://oregonstate.edu/conferences/asv2007>. All travel grant applications must be submitted to the ASV Secretary-Treasurer’s office, as indicated on the application form, along with a copy of the abstract of the research to be presented either as a talk or as a poster at the ASV’07 meeting.

Graduate Student Travel Grants. ASV grants-in-aid for graduate students to attend the annual meeting are \$400 (or \$200 for students residing within a 250-mile radius of the meeting site). Student AND Sponsor must be current ASV members, with dues paid for 2007 and prior years. Applicants are expected to present papers.

Postdoctoral Fellow Travel Grants. ASV travel awards to postdoctoral fellows to attend the national meeting are also \$400 (or \$200 for fellows residing within a 250-mile radius of the meeting site). Fellow AND Sponsor must be current ASV members (dues paid for 2007 and prior years) and Fellow should have no more than 4 years of postdoctoral experience. Applicants are expected to present papers.

Undergraduate Teacher Travel Grants. The Society will provide a limited number of \$500 awards to help teachers of undergraduate virology attend the national meeting.

Latin American Virology Scholars Travel Grants. The Society will provide a limited number of awards of up to \$2,500 for talented Latin American virologists to attend and present their work at ASV’07, in accord with the following provisions: (1) applicants must submit an abstract to present at the annual meeting; (2) they are not required to be members of the Society; (3) the ASV secretarial office will arrange to provide the airline ticket directly to the awardee; and (4) in addition, ASV will reimburse by check for registration, food, and

housing expenses upon submission of original receipts to the ASV Secretary-Treasurer after awardees return home. The award is open to scientists at all academic levels, but preference will be given to those at a level equivalent to assistant professor. Please help publicize these awards to your colleagues in Latin America.

Membership Dues. 2007 Membership Renewal Statements for the period January 1 through December 31, 2007 were mailed to all members during October. Only members in good standing will: (i) receive the ASV discounted member registration rate for the annual meeting; (ii) receive the 2007 reduced subscription rates to various virological journals; (iii) be listed in the on-line ASV membership directory and the hard-copy directory; and (iv) be allowed to sponsor abstracts or travel award applications for the upcoming annual meeting. Members in good standing are those who are current in their **2007** dues payment, including obligations from the preceding year. Those who are in arrears for two years are dropped from the Society rolls. Full members can avoid ever having to pay ASV dues again for a single payment of \$1000.

ASV ATCC Advisory Committee. The Virology Collection of the ATCC (American Type Culture Collection) in Manassas, Virginia, requests help from members of ASV in its continuing efforts to identify and accession items of scientific importance. With guidance from its ASV-ATCC Advisory Committee, the ATCC has identified several priorities for accessioning materials. These include: 1) molecular clones for use in reverse genetics, 2) upper respiratory viruses (especially recent isolates) and 3) cloned full length genomes of viruses whose nucleotides have been fully sequenced. New United States Repository for Biological Standards. As of August 2006, all NIH Reference Reagents previously available from the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID) must now be obtained from the NIAID Biodefense and Emerging Infections (BEI) Reagent Resource Repository. Viruses, bacteria, toxins, interferons and other cytokine reference reagents and antisera are now stored at this repository, which is currently managed by the American Type Culture Collection (ATCC). It is necessary to be registered with the BEI Repository prior to any request for reference reagents. Minutes of the ASV Business Meeting

Monona Terrace Convention Center

Madison, Wisconsin

Monday, 17 July 2006

1. President Peter Palese called the meeting to order at 11:20 a.m.

2. Local Arrangements. Local organizer, Paul Friesen, welcomed meeting participants and reported that registration totals 1436, noting that there were a low number of walk-in registrants this year. The break-even point for the Society was estimated at between 1100 and 1200 registrants. He expressed gratitude to meeting co-organizer, Ann Palmenberg, for all her hard work, along with the Monona Terrace Convention Center staff, the University of Wisconsin Conference Services staff, and the many volunteers. He announced that the ASV meeting would return to Madison in 2012. Peter thanked Paul and Ann for their exceptional work in organizing this year's meeting.

3. Approval of Minutes. The President requested a motion for approval of the previous year's Business Meeting minutes, as distributed, which was moved, seconded, and approved.

4. Treasurer's Report. Peter introduced Dorothea Sawicki as the newly appointed Secretary-Treasurer for the Society who will fulfill Sid Grossberg's remaining term. Thea stated that she was providing Sid Grossberg's final Treasurer's Report (attached) and that the Society is financially healthy. She explained that Sid was unable to attend this year's meeting and expressed her thanks to him for all his mentoring and assistance with the transition of the Secretary-Treasurer's office to the Medical University of Ohio, Toledo. She also thanked Judy Gaza for her assistance and announced that Judy will continue in her capacity with the Society.

She stated that this report (1 June 2005 to 30 June 2006) is a 13-month report due to the fact that the last report ended on 31 May 2005, necessitated by our earlier June meeting last year. The account balance as of 31 May 2005 was \$215,763. Income from dividends, interest, and capital gains totaled \$29,531. Membership dues totaled \$199,987, a larger amount due to the increase for student, associate, and full membership dues for the 2006 renewal period. Thea thanked Peter Palese and Harry Greenberg for their extraordinary work in raising a record \$107,933 in donations to support for this year's meeting. A balance of proceeds in the amount of \$34,269 was received from the 2004 annual meeting at McGill University. She stated that the 2005 annual meeting at Penn State University was well attended and the proceeds of \$146,220 were received in full. Income from the sale of address labels, directories, and program books amounted to \$5,017 with income from the sale of the 2005 meeting symposia DVD at \$2,069 and a small amount of \$156 from the sale of 2004 tapes. Thea stated that the Society managed 3 separate banking accounts that included the general account, the Honess Fund, and the Fields Fund. Sid approached Michael Oldstone, who was instrumental in establishing the Fields Fund, and he agreed to the proposal to incorporate the Fields Fund balance and security balances into the ASV account and discontinue the separate Fields Fund bank account at UBS. The account was closed and the cash balance of \$10,083.72 was transferred into the general ASV account and the securities

incorporated into the ASV investment balances. A principal amount of \$30,000 was returned from a matured certificate of deposit and an adjustment of \$12,376.60 was credited to the account by voiding several checks that were outstanding for over one year. Total income for the 13-month report amounted to \$622,361.52.

Thea stated that the Society spends a sizeable amount each year to provide travel grants to aid young scientists in presenting their work at the annual meeting. This year \$73,300 was paid for grants which included \$50,000 for 142 student awards; \$21,800 for 63 postdoctoral fellow awards; and \$1,500 for 3 \$500 awards to teachers of undergraduate students. Thea thanked Peter and Sid for their work in the preparation and submission of an ASV NIH grant to support additional travel awards for students, postdoctoral fellows, and teachers to attend the 2006 meeting. The 5-year grant was funded in the amount of \$30,000 for the first year, and \$10,000 for each remaining year. She also expressed the Society's thanks to Catherine Laughlin, for her assistance on this grant. Travel awards to Latin American Virology Scholars amounted to \$3,014 for the balance of 2005 awards and \$5,443 in prepaid airfares for 2006 awardees. The Medical Virology Club sponsored 4 awards of \$400 each and ASV provided 9 \$1,000 grants to young investigators to attend the 2005 International Congress of Virology meeting in San Francisco which was in addition to the 20 \$1,000 awards supported by the NIH grant ASV received to support travel to the ICV. She explained that last year the Society approved a request from Andy Pekosz, who is affiliated with the Society for the Advancement of Chicanos and Native Americans in Science (SACNAS), to establish a \$400 ASV travel grant to award to the student judged to have the best SACNAS poster to assist with expenses to attend and present the same poster at the annual ASV meeting. That student is attending this year's meeting and is presenting the poster. \$24,299 was expended for 2005 meeting speakers travel expenses, \$3,069 in prepaid expenses for the 2006 meeting speakers, \$10,204 for the ASV clubs satellite symposium speakers' expenses, and \$14,65 for Council and Committee meetings and a site visit to the University of Minnesota. FASEB expenses totaled \$62,083 that included processing, printing and mailing the 2005 Scientific Program & Abstracts book and the 2006 Call for Abstracts/Registration booklet. The Medical College of Wisconsin received a secretarial grant in the amount of \$84,000 to support the salaries and fringe benefits of staff in the Secretary-Treasurer's office. A \$25,000 grant was made to the Medical University of Ohio (MUO) to establish a grant account for secretarial expenses involved in establishing the new Secretary-Treasurer's office. Thea reported that the Medical University of Ohio provided ASV with a sizeable office, rent-free, and that she was also able to secure a lot of free office furniture for our use. Judy traveled to Toledo to spend 2 weeks assisting her with the recruiting, hiring, and training of a very competent lady, Lin Whalen, who will be the part-time secretary in the new office.

Securities and a certificate of deposit purchase, along with additional funds reinvested amounted to \$124,645, for total expenses of \$505,101. The combined checkbook balances of the ASV UBS Financial Services and M&I Bank accounts totaled \$332,931 as of 30 June 2006 and, combined with the total value of securities in the amount of \$558,477, results in total assets of \$891,408. Thea noted that the Society has not yet attained the 2.5 times the annual budget reserve that is recommended.

b. Donations Thea presented a slide announcing the names of all the donors who provided support for this year's meeting and stated that we received a record amount in donations this year thanks to the efforts of Peter and Harry Greenberg. She stated that 3 of the companies listed generously provided \$25,000 in support and one company provided \$15,000. Special thanks were extended to the University of Wisconsin-Madison and to ASV members who also provided contributions for ASV 2006.

5. Committee Reports.

a. Program Committee. Barbara Sherry, provided a slide presentation and thanked the members of the Committee and Vice-chair Roz Sandri-Goldin, for their hard work in reviewing the 887 total abstracts submitted for this meeting and delegating each to a workshop topics. The abstracts were then organized into 587 oral and 300 poster presentations. Several new workshop topics were offered this year and it worked well. There are 9 concurrent sessions with a maximum of 12 talks per session, with a total of 56 workshop convenors. She thanked the convenors and commented that suggestions and volunteers are always welcome. The 2006 program included 19 symposium speakers, 1 keynote speaker, 7 state-of-the-art speakers, 1 Education and Career Development workshop organized by Richard Kuhn, a Medical Virology Club Satellite Symposium arranged by Skip Virgin, a Plant Virology Club Satellite Symposium arranged by Marilyn Roossinck, and a Public Affairs Workshop arranged by David Sander. All posters are being displayed throughout the entire meeting. She noted that terms of several committee members have now expired and we need new members to replace them for the 3-year term of service. Anyone interested in volunteering may contact her or the ASV office directly. Barbara expressed her thanks to Rich Condit, who was her mentor before she took over as Chairman of the committee and also to Sid for all his assistance. She stated that Roz will assume the position as Chair after the conclusion of the 2007 meeting at Oregon State University. Peter thanked Barbara, Roz, and the committee members for their excellent work on this year's program.

c. Membership Committee. Anette Schneemann thanked Jessica Canseco, her assistant, who processes all the new member applications and enters the information into a database file that is transferred to the ASV office after the applications are approved. She expressed her thanks to Paul Friesen, Sid, and Judy Gaza for their assistance throughout the year. Through a slide presentation, she indicated that a total of 429 new members were elected this year and that is slightly larger than the last 2 years. This number includes 14 associate members who, after 5 years as an associate, were upgraded to full membership. She displayed a graph that identified the activity for new memberships by month, noting that the volume increases as the abstract deadline approaches. Membership is at an all-time high with a total of 3455 members with 1832 full members, 701 associates, 682 associate-students, 77 emeritus, and 163 lifetime members. Anette expressed her concern about delinquencies in the renewal of membership dues stating that almost 500 members owe 2006 dues and that there are a significantly higher number of 2-year delinquencies this year. The ASV office sends several delinquent dues notices throughout the year, both by mail and email. A member who fails to pay dues for 2 years is automatically deleted from the membership roster. She suggested that members verify their dues status with the ASV office. All-in-all, membership is in good shape. Peter thanked Anette for her presentation and good work.

d. Public Affairs Committee and ASV Jobs Website.

(1) Federal Funding. David Sander provided a slide presentation, reporting that according to 2004 data on research and development (R&D) in developed nations, the U.S. is the world leader with 37% of all R&D worldwide and increasing. \$260 billion was spent on U.S. R&D in 2003 from all sources, which is more than Japan and the European Union combined. Federal R&D data indicates that from a total of \$101 billion, 23% was allocated to industry, 41% to universities, and 22% intramural.

David reported that the President's FY 2007 budget proposes a 1.8% increase in federal R&D spending to a record \$137 billion. With a 2.2% inflation consideration, this is the first real decline since 1996. The proposed non-defense R&D is +1.6% to \$58.5 billion. The 5-year NIH doubling is now complete and the focus for future research investment is shifting to other areas. The President's American Competitiveness Initiative (ACI) proposal is for a 7.9% increase for the National Science Foundation; 14% for the Department of Energy Office of Science; and a strong focus on science education.

Placing these initiatives in a federal budget context, David stated that Federal R&D is up 50% since 2000. Economic expansion in the U.S. is strong with future budget years challenging but optimistic. R&D earmarks were up 13% in 2006 and consume 1.7% of all federal R&D dollars. Increasing entitlement spending now consumes 2/3 of the federal budget (Medicare, Social Security) and is increasing faster than inflation. Proposed funding by agency is: +6.9% R&D to \$6.0B for the National Science Foundation; +5.4% to \$608 M for the Biological sciences Directorate; Centers for Disease Control -1.8% to \$534M; Department of Homeland Security -10.3% to \$1.1B after steep increases and \$337M for biological countermeasures; Department of Agriculture: -16.6% to remove Congressional earmarks and to increase extramural grants with a 37% increase for the National Research Institute; +3.7% to \$9.0B, eliminating Congressional earmarks, and increased physical sciences and energy R&D proposed for the Department of Energy; +0.0% to \$28.6B for the NIH with +6.2% increase in biodefense research to \$1.9B; HIV/AIDS research -0.5% to \$2.9B; NIAID boosted 0.3% to \$4.4B; other institutes -0.2 to 0.8%; fund 35,000 grants with 19% success rate (-1% FY06); NIH roadmap for Medical Research: plan to fund gaps in biomedical research - up 34.4% to \$443M.

David stated that the Public Affairs Committee is looking for additional committee members and that anyone interested should contact him for further information.

(2) ASV Virology Jobs website: David reported that the ASV has succeeded in creating the leading Virology Jobs website and use of the site remains free to post jobs and resumes. Users may search for jobs by keyword, region, or type of employment and can post a job and/or resumé on the site. The site may be accessed by visiting the ASV website at www.asv.org or at www.virology.net. He urged members to make use of the website and promote its availability.

e. Education and Career Development Committee. Chairman, Richard Kuhn, thanked the members of this committee and reported that their main function is to review the teacher and Latin American Scholar travel grant applications, select the awardees, and to organize the Education and Career Development Workshop at the annual meeting. He invited everyone to attend this year's workshop entitled "Strategies for a Successful Career: Life After Postdoc" which is scheduled on Tuesday at 4:00 p.m. He reported that after this meeting, Glenn Rall replaces him as Chair of the committee. They are looking for suggestions for next year's workshop and requested that people email him or Glenn with their suggestions. Peter thanked Richard for his service on this committee.

f. ATCC Advisory Committee. Yong Kang explained that the American Type Culture Collection (ATCC) was incorporated in 1925, and the Plant and Animal Virus Collections were established in the 1950's. ATCC maintains over 2,500 holdings of viruses and antisera. The number of collections is very limited. The ATCC is seeking to obtain additional orphan collections but they

require support to accomplish future acquisitions. Charles Buck, Head of the Virology Collection, has left the ATCC and Raymond Cologna, Ph.D. has been appointed to replace him. The NCRR recommended that the ATCC seek support from the NIH. Yong stated that the research community has repeatedly requested cloned viral nucleic acids, especially the full length genomes, and the ASV-ATCC Advisory Committee has strongly recommended acquisition of full length genomes of all available cloned viral genomes. He noted that the ATCC will begin acquisitions of cloned viral genomes and plan to distribute upon request.

7. Election results. Peter reported the results of the 2006 election: President-elect, Ann Palmenberg, Professor of Biochemistry and Chair Institute for Molecular Virology, University of Wisconsin-Madison; Councilor for Animal Virology, Karla Kirkegaard, Professor and Chair, Department of Microbiology and Immunology, Stanford University School of Medicine; Councilor for Invertebrate Virology, Gary Blissard, Scientist and vice President for Research, Boyce Thompson Institute, Cornell University.

8. Most recent actions of ASV Council.

a. Plans for the 2007 meeting. Dennis Hruby, our local host at Oregon State University (OSU), provided a visual presentation and invited members to Corvallis where plans for the meeting 14-18 July, are well underway. He stated that the conference website is operational and can be accessed directly at <http://oregonstate.edu/conferences/asv2007> and through a link on the ASV website. He stated that OSU is a land grant university with approximately 20,000 students. The Portland International Airport is located about 90-minute from Corvallis and shuttle service will be available every 90 minutes. Eugene Regional Airport, a smaller airport, is a 45-minute drive to the university and will provide on-demand shuttle service. The weather averages 80-85 degrees, with lots of activities and sites to visit in the area. Corvallis is located 45 minutes from the Pacific Ocean. Our 2008 annual meeting will be held at Cornell University, Ithaca, 12-16 July.

b. Peter announced that Council has approved venues for annual meetings through 2013 as follows: Oregon State University, 2007; Cornell University, 2008; University of British Columbia, Vancouver, 2009; Montana State University, 2010; University of Minnesota, 2011; University of Wisconsin-Madison, 2012; and Penn State University, 2013. The University of Kentucky, Lexington, was interested in having us return to their campus for a future meeting and we will investigate this proposal further.

c. Peter reported that Council approved increasing the cap for the Latin American Scholar travel awards from \$1,500 to a maximum of \$2,500 for reimbursement of travel expenses to participate in the ASV annual meeting. Council also approved a cap of \$5,000 for a grant to the University of Wisconsin-Madison, to digitize all the program/abstract books, commencing with 1982 through the present to create a historical archive of this information.

9. Presentation of Certificates to Outgoing Councilors. Peter expressed the Society's gratitude to the outgoing Councilors, Vincent Racaniello and Anette Schneemann. He also presented certificates to

Paul Friesen and Ann Palmenberg, with gratitude for all their work in making this year's meeting a success.

10. Other business. Peter announced that the NIH honored Hilary Koprowski for 50 years of funding. Catherine Laughlin was scheduled to present Hilary with a plaque to honor him for this achievement. Unfortunately, Hilary was unable to attend this meeting so the plaque will be mailed to him.

11. Introduction of the New President. Peter introduced Don Ganem as the new President of the Society and Peter expressed his thanks to everyone for their participation in the 25th anniversary meeting of the Society. On behalf of the Society Don thanked Peter and presented him with a plaque from the Society in appreciation for the excellent job he did for the Society this year. He invited everyone to Corvallis, Oregon, for the 2008 ASV annual meeting.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned at 12:30 p.m.
