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Dear Fellow ASV Member:

I am writing this newsletter to give you an update on various ASV activities and to let you know about the exciting plans we have made for next year's annual meeting at Montana State University in Bozeman, Montana. This will be our second visit to Big Sky Country and I think the exciting program agenda will match the picturesque scenery. More information about the meeting is provided below but be sure to mark off July 17-21st on your calendar and plan to attend. The 2010 meeting will be modeled on our traditional schedule, starting with the Saturday afternoon Welcome Reception and the Keynote Address on Saturday night followed by four outstanding morning plenary symposia as well as afternoons and evenings packed with an assortment of workshops, State-of-the-Art lectures, poster sessions and social mixers so that you can catch up with old friends and make new ones. As you may know, our 29 year old Society exists for one important purpose, that is, to hold an annual meeting where all investigators interested in Virology, from molecular biology to epidemiology can come together to hear about one another's research and exchange ideas. The Society has had extraordinary success in fulfilling these goals and I am looking forward to seeing all of you in Bozeman to continue this tradition.

Membership Dues

Membership in the ASV is a bargain and I strongly encourage each of you to keep your membership active so you and your lab members can take full advantage of all the ASV has to offer. Membership renewal statements for the period January 1 through December 31, 2010 were mailed to all members in early October. It is really critical to pay your dues before the January 1, 2010 due date. You may pay your dues by mail, fax or online on the ASV website by credit card (Visa, MasterCard or American Express). Online renewal is especially convenient. After a few clicks and providing your secure credit card information, your dues are paid and your membership is renewed. And in keeping with the current financial downturn, ASV dues have not increased this year.

ASV members who are paying delinquent dues online should select the "Other Amount" category and enter the total amount they are paying. Delinquent dues for 2009 and even 2008 can be paid this way. This payment will of course result in restoration of your membership in good standing.

It is important to note that only full members who have paid their 2010 dues may sponsor abstracts and travel award applications submitted for the 2010 annual meeting, and that only student and postdoctoral fellow members current in their 2010 dues may submit travel award applications for the meeting. The 2010 Call for Abstracts and registration information booklet is scheduled to be mailed to the ASV membership this month. **The deadline for the electronic submission of abstracts is February 1, 2010.** All abstracts must be submitted electronically to the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology (FASEB) through the conference web site at www.asv2010.com. **Please remember that abstract submission is final and abstracts, once submitted, will be scheduled for oral or poster presentations and will be printed in the ASV Scientific Program and Abstract Book sent to all ASV meeting registrants. Abstracts that are withdrawn will disrupt the Workshop and Poster Session schedules and withdrawn abstracts will still appear in the Program and Abstract book. No exceptions.**

2009 ASV meeting

The 28th annual meeting, attended by 1298 participants, was held at the University of British Columbia, Vancouver, Canada from July 11th to 15th. Janet Chandler and her conference staff did a brilliant job organizing this meeting. Our ASV past President, Harry Greenberg organized a superb array of speakers for the four well-planned plenary sessions. On behalf of the Society, I wish to thank Bert Semler, Program Committee Vice-Chair and the members of the Program Committee for helping me to put together a terrific slate of State-of-the-Art speakers, workshops and poster sessions, while I was Program Committee Chair. In all, there were 7 State-of-the-Art speakers and 1002 submitted abstracts presented, with 546 oral presentations in 54 workshop sessions and 456 poster presentations in 2 poster sessions. Bert Semler takes over the position of Program Committee Chair for the 2010 meeting, aided by Paula Traktman, the new Program Committee Vice-Chair.

Donations to the Society solicited by Harry Greenberg totaled \$42,612, which includes a donation for the annual Lois K. Miller Lectureship. In addition, \$3,462 was raised by the Plant Virology Club in support of an annual Milt Zaitlin Student Travel Award. I will be calling on several of you shortly to help me continue to raise valuable philanthropic support for our society during these difficult economic times. These funds play a critical role in supporting meeting attendance of students wishing to present their findings to the larger virology community.

ASV 2009 Annual Meeting - DVDs

DVDs of the 2009 keynote and symposium talks at the annual meeting held at University of British Columbia are now available. These DVDs are inexpensive (\$110/set or \$15/each) and can be useful as teaching aids and for members who were not able to attend the meeting. A copy of the order form is available on the ASV website at www.asv.org. The Society is also exploring the feasibility of making the plenary session presentations more widely available through some form of web broadcast. While there are a number of issues involved with such an effort, these presentations are of such high quality that it would be wonderful if they could be made available to a wider audience, especially those in less developed countries who do not have the opportunity to attend the ASV meeting.

2010 ASV meeting

The 29th Annual Meeting will take place on the campus of Montana State University, Bozeman, Montana from July 17th to 21st, 2010. Michele Hardy will be our host and plans for the meeting are well underway. You should have already received a brochure on Montana State University and the ASV 2010 meeting. Complete information regarding the scientific program, travel, lodging and registration will be available, as it develops, on the conference web site at www.asv2010.com. There will be one change in the Registration fees compared to previous years to assist with your travel planning and expense reimbursement. Instead of

registering for the Banquet, which has been traditionally held on Tuesday night of the meeting, as a separate fee on the registration form, you will be able to register (with the usual meals provided in the registration fee) with or without Tuesday night dinner. Those who register with the Tuesday night dinner option will receive tickets for Tuesday night dinner (Banquet) for the additional cost of \$55. Those not wishing to attend the Banquet may register for the meeting without Tuesday night dinner for a lower fee.

Remember that the abstract deadline is Monday, February 1, 2010 and abstracts must be submitted electronically on the conference website link to FASEB. **Please remember that abstract submission is final and abstracts, once submitted, will be scheduled for oral or poster presentations and will be printed in the ASV Scientific Program and Abstract Book sent to all ASV registrants. No changes can be made to abstracts after they are submitted.**

Montana State University's beautifully landscaped campus is an exceptionally attractive meeting venue. Bozeman is situated in the heart of the Rocky Mountains, surrounded by four mountain ranges. Nearby activities include white water rafting, blue ribbon fly fishing, hiking and biking as well as scenic tours through Yellowstone National Park. You may want to take a few extra days to experience Bozeman and surrounding areas either pre-meeting or post-meeting.

Scientific program for the 2010 meeting

The program for the 2010 ASV meeting promises to be outstanding. The keynote address will be delivered by past ASV President Diane Griffin, Johns Hopkins University, and is titled "Virus clearance: it isn't easy". There will be four plenary symposia. On Sunday, the "Virus-Cell Interactions" Symposium will feature Lori Frappier, University of Toronto; James Alwine, University of Pennsylvania; Anne Moscona, Weill Medical College of Cornell University; Matthew Weitzman, Salk Institute and John Hiscott, McGill University. On Monday, the speakers for the "Viral Evolution and Diverse Interactions with the Environment" Symposium will include Marilyn Roossinck, Samuel Roberts Noble Foundation; Julie Pfeiffer, University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center; Mark Young, Montana State University and Bentley Fane, University of Arizona. Tuesday's Symposium on "Viral Replication and Gene Expression" will feature Karla Kirkegaard, Stanford University; Anne Simon, University of Maryland; Ian Mohr, New York University Medical School; Denise Galloway, Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center and Curt Horvath, Northwestern University. The meeting will conclude on Wednesday with the Symposium "Viral Pathogenesis and Immunity". Speakers for this Symposium will be Andrew Pekosz, Johns Hopkins University; Katherine Spindler, University of Michigan; Stanley Perlman, University of Iowa; Stacey Schultz-Cherry, St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital and Michael Gale, University of Washington. Nearly all the speakers will be presenting for their first time at an ASV plenary session, which should provide all of us with the opportunity to hear many new and exciting stories.

The popular State-of-the-Art lectures, organized by Bert Semler (Program Committee Chair) and Paula Traktman (Program Committee Vice-Chair), will cover a number of interesting topics. The speakers will include: Camille Sureau, INTS, Paris, France (Interaction between hepatitis B and D viruses: a one-way relationship); Joel Baines, Cornell University (Assembly and egress of herpesvirus nucleocapsids); Douglas Lyles, Wake Forest University School of Medicine (Suppression of host antiviral responses by rhabdoviruses); Donald Nuss, University of Maryland Biotech Institute (Mycoviruses, RNA silencing and RNA recombination); Charles Rice, Rockefeller University (Hepatitis C virus: new insights into replication and control); Laura Kramer, New York State Department of Health (Ecology and evolution of West Nile virus), and Kathleen Collins, University of Michigan (HIV persistence).

The Education and Career Development Committee (chaired by Rebecca Dutch) will host a workshop titled "Tales from the Trenches: Surprising Factors in Scientific Success". The concept for this workshop is that while intelligence, creativity and hard-work are crucial to a successful career in science, other factors such

as dealing with failure, developing fruitful collaborations and managing a team are also important factors. Graduate students and postdoctoral fellows are especially encouraged to attend.

On Saturday, preceding the ASV meeting, the Medical Virology Club will sponsor a satellite symposium organized by Terry Dermody on “Viruses and Cancer: Cause, Cure, and Prevention”. Speakers will include: Erle S. Robertson, University of Pennsylvania; Patrick S. Moore, University of Pittsburgh; Britt Glaunsinger, University of California, Berkeley; Roberto Cattaneo, The Mayo Clinic; Peter Forsyth, University of Calgary; Grant McFadden, University of Florida; Cliona M. Rooney, Baylor College of Medicine, and Laura Koutsky, University of Washington.

Also on Saturday, preceding the ASV meeting, the Plant Virology Club will sponsor a satellite symposium organized by Bryce Falk titled “International Plant Virology”. Speakers will include Jesus Navas-Castillo, Estación Experimental ‘La Mayora’, Consejo Superior de Investigaciones Científicas, Málaga, Spain; Massimo Turina, Istituto di Virologia Vegetale, CNR, Torino, Italy; Isabelle Jupin, Laboratoire de Virologie Moléculaire, Institut Jacques Monod, CNRS-Universités Paris, France; Lesley Torrance, Scottish Crops Research Institut, Scotland; Hsin-Hung Yeh, National Taiwan University, Taiwan; Garry Sunter, University of Texas at San Antonio; Svetlana Folimonova, University of Florida, Lake Alfred, FL; Feng Qu, Ohio State University, Wooster, OH and James Ng, University of California, Riverside, CA.

Increased Funding Levels for ASV Travel Awards

As a reminder, the ASV has increased the amount of the student and postdoctoral fellow travel grant awards to \$500 each. The application forms will be available to download from the ASV 2010 conference website at www.asv2010.com and the ASV website at www.asv.org. Please note that all applicants must submit an abstract for presentation at the upcoming annual meeting and also be current (dues paid for 2010) members of ASV. All full member sponsors for the abstracts and travel grant applications must be current in the payment of their 2010 membership dues. In addition, ASV Council approved increasing the amount of the travel awards for Teachers of Undergraduate Students from \$500 to \$1,000 each.

2010 ASV meeting

As in previous meetings, EACH MEETING PARTICIPANT MAY MAKE ONLY ONE WORKSHOP PRESENTATION. Information for computer formats for oral presentations and size dimensions for poster presentations will be made available on the ASV web site along with registration information. In addition, each presenter will receive instructions when he/she is notified of the workshop or poster session in which his/her abstract will be presented. Oral presentations will be limited to 12 min. with an additional 3 min. for discussion. *Overhead projectors and slide projectors will not be available.*

Future annual meetings

The Society’s 30th annual meeting scheduled for **July 16-20, 2011**, will be held at the University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, with Louis Mansky as our local host.

The 31st annual meeting returns us to the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and the Monona Terrace Convention Center, **July 21-25, 2012**, and once again will be organized by our local host and ASV past President, Ann Palmenberg.

ASV’s 32nd annual meeting will once again take place at The Pennsylvania State University, University Park on **July 20-24, 2013**, where our local host will be Richard Frisque.

The 33rd annual meeting will be held at Colorado State University, Fort Collins, **June 20-25, 2014**. Jeff Wilusz will be the local host.

ASV membership

The ASV membership holds steady at around 3244 members, including 1634 Full Members, 242 Lifetime Members, 89 Emeritus Members, 693 Associate Members, and 586 Associate-Student Members. Of the 3244 total members, 371 of you are delinquent on your 2009 dues. Membership renewals for 2010 are due by January 1st. Renewal notices were mailed to all members in mid-October. If you wish to remain a member, please pay your dues promptly and update your contact information online! Please note that only full members current in the payment of their 2010 dues may sponsor abstracts submitted for presentation at the 2010 annual meeting and sponsor travel award applications submitted by students and postdoctoral fellows. All applicants for student or postdoctoral fellow travel grants must be current (dues paid for 2010) members of ASV to be considered for a travel grant. New member applicants submitting travel grant applications must submit their online applications on or before February 1, 2010 to be eligible for an award. The ASV Membership Committee is chaired by David Miller, University of Michigan. Applications for new memberships may be made through the ASV website.

Latin American Programs

As many of you know, the ASV supports travel of Latin American virologists to the annual ASV meeting. The award level has been increased to a maximum of \$2,500 in expenses. Applicants must submit an abstract for presentation but need not be ASV members. The Education and Career Development Committee will review applications and make the selections. Please encourage your Latin American colleagues to apply.

ASV 2010 Election

The Society's 2010 election will be conducted electronically on the ASV website and will commence February 1, 2010 through April 15th. Federal Funding Update

David Sander, Chair of the Public Affairs Committee, continues to keep us informed about the NIH budget and other federal research support. As I write this newsletter, I have just received an update from the National Institutes of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID), the source of NIH funding for many of us, that the payline has been set at the 6th percentile for RO1 applications and at the 10th percentile for RO1 applications from new investigators. Setting paylines at this low level is unprecedented in the history of NIH and it casts a doubtful future for research in virology at the same time that we have a pandemic of H1N1 with vaccine production behind projections, as well little progress on vaccine development for HIV, HCV and many other viruses. Francis Collins, the new director of NIH, has urged the scientific community to get the word out, that is, to communicate to the public what we do and what our successes have been to merit increased funding. To this end, we are trying to schedule a podcast during the 2010 meeting by Vincent Rancaniello on using new technologies to spread the word. The Education Committee is investigating the start of a Facebook page for the society to reach out in what has become a popular medium. The bottom line, if we want to keep the public and congress in favor of supporting scientific research, we have to make

what we do accessible to the public and we have to clearly demonstrate how what we do benefits the greater good.

I wish you all a productive and exciting year and look forward to seeing you at Montana State University in Bozeman in July.
